President's Message

Aloha Compatriots,

The experience of the transition to post-COVID working and social environments has been different for everyone based on their work and life situation. COVID remained a concern for many, and this influenced decisions on whether or not annual events, such as the Cadet Awards Ceremonies, patriotic commemorations, etc., would be held in-person. It also influenced decisions on the appropriate size of

community attendance. As the pages of this issue of the *Hawaii Patriot* will show, we did manage to support important commemorations, cadet programs, Eagle Scout awards, to carry out community service, to convene together, and to plan for future activities. President Biden has declared on September 19th that the COVID pandemic is over, and so we should count on in-person events going forward. Over the last 2.5 years, we've moved many of our meetings to Zoom, and we can continue to employ that tool as a back-up, but it is time to meet together in-person, and to once again volunteer to represent our National Society here in Hawaii for commemorations, cadet programs, and Eagle Scout recognition. We are a volunteer organization, and it only works when people volunteer to help carry part of the load.

Our organization must be focused on carrying out the National Society's top priority program, which is the semi quincentennial. As you will read in this issue, we have made a good start on that, but we now need volunteers to give time to putting a State-wide program in-place, with our State Society providing leadership in establishing a committee that will plan and execute the 250th in Hawaii. Our recent experience with the WWI Centennial and the Vietnam War 50th show us what can be accomplished when we work together with other civic and patriotic organizations.

Our annual General Membership meeting at the Fort Shafter Hale Ikena Club was a very nice evening, and we were pleased to have the Hawaii DAR attending. We ran this meeting as more of a social event than a business meeting, and yet, we did formulate consensus on our approach to work with the Hawaii DAR on the 250th program. We recognized those who have made important contributions to establishing a State Committee, and on those projects we can do on our own, with, or without State leadership. We also recognized community exemplars for their service.

A few words now about volunteering. In the Revolutionary War, the number of "effectives," or those able to march and fight, was a professional estimate of the percentage of the force "fit for duty." During the Civil War, the Confederates used the term "effectives" to describe the subset of the number of soldiers present for duty (PFD), who could effectively march into battle, and this was typically about 93% of the "present for duty" count. If you are "fit for duty" then please volunteer to support when the call is issued. The well-known '80/20 principle' that says 80% of the work accomplished in an organization can be attributed to just 20% of the work force is also in play for volunteer organizations, except that since no one receives wages, the principle is a 90/10 proposition. A sincere Mahalo to those who did volunteer to present cadet awards, flag certificates, and Eagle Scout certificates, and also those who volunteered to officially attend commemorations. John Smith deserves great credit for covering all 3 major events this last Memorial Day, and representing our Society well. We are a volunteer organization and need members to volunteer to represent our State Society at major commemorations and other events. We have Veterans Day and Pearl Harbor Day coming up, which will present more opportunities in the remainder of this calendar year to volunteer. If we are to increase the number of "effectives," then recruiting is a task every member should take on. Our top priority for the next 10 months is to assist candidates with their applications, to bring them on as full compatriots, who can participate in our mission of service. Many 'mahalos' are due to our award-winning Registrar and Genealogist, Chris Smithson, who is doing just that.

Hawaii Society Prepares for the 250th Anniversary of USA.

Hawaii Compatriot Rep. Matt LoPresti presented House and Senate concurrent resolutions to go to the Governor to approve the establishment of a State committee, commission, or Task Force to plan and carry out the States 250th activities. The concurrent House and Senate Resolutions (HR166 and SR205) proposed by Hawaii SAR Compatriot Rep. Matt LoPresti were both approved by their respective committees. These ask the Governor to appoint a 250th Commission, Committee, or Task Force to plan and carry out Hawaii's contributions to the national commemoration.

The Hawaii SAR mobilized to get testimony submitted from other civic organizations, as well as the Veterans Service Organizations. According to Col, Ret. Ron Han, Director of the Office of Veterans Services of the Hawaii State Department of Defense, the responsibility at the State level for oversight will most likely go to the for execution, as was the case for the 50th Vietnam War Commemoration, and the WWI Centennial Commemoration. The Hawaii State DoD is aware that the Hawaii SAR and DAR are going to be members of the volunteer organization the State will form if the Governor decides to act. The concurrent resolutions call on the Governor to establish a Committee for the Semi quincentennial Commemorations were approved in the House and Senate, and sent forward by the relevant committees.

Compatriots Arthur Tulak and Dan Curtis reached out to various organizations, and obtained support from the Capt. Gaylord Dillingham Chapter of the Military Order of the World Wars, Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 10276, National Sojourners Hawaii Chapter #9, all of whom submitted written testimony. In addition Arthur, Dan and Rob Moore each submitted their own testimony. In addition, Margaret Russo and Julene Ignacio, of the Hawaii DAR submitted written their testimony in support. A total of 9 testimonies for HR 166, and another 8 for SR 205 were enough to get these through to completion. The testimonies submitted represented a broad-based response, and this prompt action is remarkable, given that in each case, we had only 2 or 3 days to get testimony submitted.

As is reported in the following article on the General Membership meeting, the Hawaii SAR is very keen to support Hawaii DAR efforts to erect a memorial commemorating Patriot CAPT John Kendrick, which will be erected at Walker Park near the Aloha Tower.

A recent update is that Col Ron Han, the Director of the Office of Veterans Services of the Hawaii State DoD, reported on September 16, 2022, that the joint resolution is still being considered, and so we must continue to plan for how the Hawaii Society of the SAR will help to lead this commemoration for the State. Compatriot Elwin Spray reports that at the national SAR meeting the national federal Rev War Celebrations Commission is making grants to state commissions of \$10,000 each, which would certainly be enough to start a program and bring in other partners and resources.

The Hawaii Society conducted its annual general membership meeting at the Hale Ikena Club at Fort Shafter. We were honored to have Derek Brown, Western District Secretary, his wife Janet, and Ms. Christine Domhoff, the Vice Regent of the Hawaii DAR.

Special guests also included CSM, Ret. David Brasher, and his wife Micaela. CSM Brasher is the Non Commissioned Officer in charge of the Hawaii Multiple Schools Unit, which oversees all the JROTC programs in Hawaii, and serves as a Brigade level Headquarters, coordinating the engagement with Veterans, Civic, and patriotic organizations such as ours throughout the year.

Two applicants also attended, Theodore "Ted" Hart, and COL, Ret. William Sorrells. Ted served 5 years of active duty with the U.S. Coast Guard. Ted's Patriot Ancestor is Archibald Perkins Senior who served in the North Carolina Regiment at saw duty at the battle of Guilford Courthouse. COL Sorrell's Patriot Ancestor is Joseph P. Thompson, who furnished the Army in South Carolina with provisions such as corn, rye, flours, leather, as well as food for soldiers and horses.

President Tulak gave a short presentation on Patriot Captain John Kendrick, his service in the Revolutionary War, and later as an explorer, whose life was taken by British naval gunfire in Honolulu Harbor. Margaret Russo, the Treasurer & America 250th Chair for the Hawaii State DAR Organization, has been working on erecting an NSDAR monument in honor of CAPT John Kendrick, to be placed near the old Honolulu Fort. The Hawaii Society of the SAR will work with Margaret to accomplish this. We will start by completing initial research if we can get a marker laid at Walker Park, on the perimeter of the fountain, across from the Aloha Tower, the site of the Old Honolulu Fort. Margaret was one of those who supported our call to action for testimony to be submitted to both the Hawaii State House and Senate in support of the Joint Resolution proposed by Compatriot LoPresti.

As is customary at our annual general membership meetings, many were recognized for their service to community. We were very pleased to recognize two exemplars, **CSM David Brasher** and **Margaret Russo**. CSM Brasher received the Good Citizenship Medal for his contributions at the state level for his leadership of approximately 3,000 cadets in the program annually. Over the course of the last few years in working the annual Cadet Awards Ceremonies, it is clear that CSM Brasher goes above and beyond to ensure his cadets are learning and preparing to be good citizens themselves. The NSSAR





regulations explain that this medal is awarded in recognition of outstanding and unusual patriotic achievement and service, and adds "The medal is presented to persons of prominence in the areas of government (including military service), religion, education, business and other professions, and other fields of endeavor."

President Tulak presented a Bronze 250th Medal to Margaret Russo, accepted by Christine Domhoff on her behalf. Also receiving the Bronze 250th Medal was our Vice President, Matt LoPresti, for his hard work as the Representative of Hawaii's House District 41, as the Vice-Chair of the House Committee on Culture, Arts, & International Affairs and also as a member on the House Committee on Health, Human Services, & Homelessness, and the House Committee on the Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Medal, which is awarded to a compatriot in recognition of outstanding services rendered to a District or State. The recipient must have served as an active officer for a minimum of two years, as an active committee chairman for three years, or as an active member of a committee for four years. WD Secretary Brown also presented the Hawaii Society with a streamer to affix to the State Society Flag for its contributions in helping to start the 250th program in the state.

In going through the work to assemble his application and join this volunteer organization, he honors the service and sacrifice of his Patriot Ancestor and 7th Great Grandfather, Henry Putnam Sr., ACN: 102259 and SAR Patriot #: P-274525. Brett was among the new Compatriots listed in the Summer **SAR Magazine** on p. 54.

Brett earned his PhD in Technical Communication and Rhetoric from Texas Tech University in 2011, and is currently an Associate Professor with the University of Hawaii at Manoa. Previous to this appointment, he served as an Assistant Professor at Washington State University. At UH, he is tenured with the School of Communications, College of Social Sciences.

Brett's Patriot Ancestor, Henry Putnam Sr., was born August 14, 1712 in Salem Massachusetts, and served as a Minuteman in the Danvers Company. He is said to have been at the capture of Louisburg in June 1745, while in command of a company there. During the Revolutionary War, he served as a volunteer, being well past the fighting age in 1775. He fought in the "Battles of Lexington, and Concord," specifically the fighting on April 19, 1775, which raged over 16 miles along the Bay Road from Boston to Concord. Henry and was killed in action at Menotomy Engagement in Middlesex MA on that day.

Hawaii Society Participates in Memorial Day 2022

Compatriot John G. Smith represented our Society at all three major events this Memorial Day. This is a challenging feat covering two days of action. Compatriot Smith presented a floral lei at the 34th Annual Memorial Day Observance held at the World War One Memorial and Natatorium on Sunday, May 29th. The event begins at 10 a.m., and is preceded by the American Legion Riders of Post 17, who arrive before the official start. This ceremony is not sponsored by the City or State, and is run a day ahead of those State and City administered ceremonies. This event is run in a collective manner with Veterans and Civic Organizations in cooperation with the Friends of the Natatorium.

The active and reserve military have provided great support to this event, as evidenced by LtGen Steven R. Rudder, commander, U.S. Marine Corps Forces, Pacific, and Commanding General of the Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, serving as the keynote speaker. The U.S. Indo-Pacific Joint Service Color Guard provided the colors to begin the ceremony, which is held annually to honor Hawaii's fallen service members and pay special tribute to the nearly 10,000 Hawaiians who volunteered for service in the First World War.

Compatriot Smith also volunteered to present a wreath at the 71st Mayor's Memorial Day Ceremony at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific on Memorial Day. The host, Honolulu Mayor Rick Blangiardi remarked:

"With the tumultuous circumstances created by the pandemic and Russia's unprovoked attack on Ukraine, our appreciation for the sacrifices made by those who came before us demand commemoration now more than ever."

This event is made more memorable by the extensive decoration of the graves with more than floral leis made by local volunteers at local parks in the days leading up to the ceremony. Again, the military leadership was there to pay its respects, with General Charles Flynn, Commanding General of U.S. Army Pacific serving as the senior military officer present, reinforced by MG, Ret. Suzanne Vares-Lum.

DNA. Once his remains were identified, his descendants were notified and the body was reinterred in his home town in Wichita KS.

The Guest Speaker was Ray Kapaun, whose Uncle, U.S. Army Captain, (Chaplain) Ray Kapaun, was lost in the Korean War. Chaplain Kapaun received the Medal of Honor, but his remains were not identified until recently. Emil was a Roman Catholic priest / Army chaplain who served in World War II in the Burma Theater. Chaplain Kapaun served in the 8th Cav Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division. On Oct 2, 1950, in heavy fighting, his unit was ordered to withdraw, but Chaplain Kapaun, stayed with the wounded. After his capture in Korea, he was imprisoned by in the Chinese-run prison camp, Camp #5. He died in captivity on May 23, 1951 from malnutrition Pyoktang, north Korea. Following the war, his remains were among the 1,868 returned to the United States by Communist north Korea. These unknowns were buried in the Punchbowl. On March 2, 2021, the DPAA positively identified his remains through
