# Let Freedom Ring! Hawaii Celebrates July 4

July 4 began with a stirring and solemn ringing of bells at the Arizona Memorial Center at Pearl Harbor. The bell was rung by Everett Hyland, former Radioman Third Class, US Navy, and William S. Cope, an Air Corps B-17 Pilot and veteran of Hickam Field on December 7, 1941.



Americans and visitors across Hawaii celebrated July 4 with patriotic enthusiasm and customary aloha. On July 3 fireworks decorated the skies above the historic Aloha Tower in Honolulu. Kailua held its annual July 4 parade on Oahu's Windward coast, and Schofield Barracks held a 4th of July Spectacular. An organ recital featuring patriotic tunes was performed at St. Andrew's Episcopal Cathedral. Central Union Church held its annual Independence Day Picnic. In the evening a Fourth of July Fireworks Display with entertainment was celebrated by crowds at Ala Moana Beach Park near Waikiki and elsewhere around the 50<sup>th</sup> State.

Beginning in 2008 the Hawaii SAR will be working directly with the National Parks Service and the Arizona Memorial Association on this memorable event at the USS Arizona at Pearl Harbor.

#### **Our Mission**



# Presidential Memorial Certificates

A Presidential Memorial Certificate (PMC) is an engraved paper certificate, signed by the current President to honor the memory of honorably-discharged deceased veterans.

This program was initiated in March 1962 by President John F. Kennedy and has been continued by all subsequent Presidents. Statutory authority for the program is Section 112, Title 38, of the United States Code. The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) administers the PMC program by preparing the certificates that bear the current President's signature expressing the country's grateful recognition of the veteran's service in the United States Armed Forces.

Eligible recipients include the next of kin and loved ones of honorably discharged deceased veterans. More than one certificate may be provided. Eligible recipients, or someone acting on their behalf, may apply for a PMC in person at any VA regional office or by U.S. mail or toll-free fax. Requests cannot be sent via email.

Please be sure to enclose a copy of the veteran's discharge and death certificate to verify eligibility. They cannot process any request without proof of honorable military service. Submit copies only; they will not return original documents.
